The Shelter team has been very busy the last couple of months getting ready for some big changes. Not only did we continue to help animals as part of our normal routine, we also jumped right into implementing new shelter management software. For years, CASA has been tracking the daily operations and running with nothing more than paper and pen. It is a lot of work to go through a month's paperwork to find monthly totals. Hopefully those days will soon be behind us.

We chose PetPoint Animal Management Software as our new software for many reasons. The CASA staff has been taking part in private online training classes 2-3 times weekly and entering past and current records into our new program each day. Used by many other shelters, it will not only enable the shelter to track almost everything that goes on with animals and the people involved, it will also provide more benefits to our community. *(See the PetPoint article for more information about these benefits.)*

We are excited about these changes and hope that new adopters will be just as thrilled. Even if you are not looking to add a furry family member to your home at this time, we encourage you to come in and see our animals. Other shelters have to deal with the same dilemma - how to find homes for these overlooked cats.

As a feature story, this one is short. But hopefully it brings an important but all too often overlooked message that you will remember. We have many lovable animals at the shelter who may not fit your initial picture of the perfect pet, but they wait silently for you to see them and recognize the love they have to offer. The next time you are in, ask about the quiet animals, those who are so easily overlooked. Thanks.

PetPoint Animal Management Software

In January, the shelter will implement the PetPoint Animal Management Program. This web-based animal management system will allow the shelter management to store and retrieve information about all the animals, adopters, volunteers, etc. who pass through the shelter. Visit www.petpoint.com and look at the licensed users to see other shelters using this program.

Using the 24PetWatch microchip program, we will now microchip all dogs and cats who are adopted at no additional charge to the customer. For many years CASA has made sure that each and every dog adopted from our shelter was microchipped prior to leaving with their new families. We have also offered this as an optional service to cats for a small additional fee at the time of adoption. By the end of January CASA will have new microchips and will be microchipping every cat and kitten prior to adoption at no additional fee to adopters. We are thrilled to know that all of our CASA animals will be reentering the world with a tiny little addition that may help them find their way back home if they ever become lost or stolen.

Cat microchipping is not the only new service CASA will be providing new adopters. PetPoint will also allow us to give the gift of pet insurance, free for 30 days, to all new adopters! Adopting a new pet is exciting, but can also be filled with "what ifs." We are hoping that these changes, microchipping and receiving 30 days of insurance, will help ease the minds of new adopters so they can focus on simply spending quality time with their new family members.







2010 Dog and Cat Statistics



During 2010 143 dogs came to the shelter. 74 adopted, 56 reunited with their owner, 10 went to other rescues, 1 was euthanized (due to health) and 2 were still available at the end of the year.

During 2010 284 cats came to the shelter. 175 adopted, 5 reunited with their owner, 67 went to rescues (primarily unweaned kittens to avoid overcrowding), 2 were euthanized (due to health), 13 under-age kittens died in foster and 22 cats were available at year-end.







Our Hemingway Kittens

Not long ago a mother cat with five kittens was brought to the shelter. The kittens were cute (aren't all kittens cute?). But these kittens were special. As the staff was checking them over, they noticed that their feet were different. Instead of the usual five toes on each of their front paws and four toes on each hind paw, for a total of 18 toes altogether, these kittens had more toes and different looking toes on their paws. They are known as polydactyl cats, mitten or thumb cats or Hemingway cats. The mother cat and kittens were kept in foster care until the kittens were old enough to be adopted. When they came back to CASA ready for adoption, they were all adopted within a couple days.

Why Hemingway cats?

Ernest Hemingway was an inveterate cat-lover, because he admired the spirit and independence of cats. Hemingway acquired his first cat from a ship's captain in Key West, Florida, where he made his home for a number of years. This cat, which may have been a Maine Coon, had extra toes (technically known as polydactyl, Latin for "many digits"). Today, approximately 60 cats, half of them polydactyl, make their home in the Ernest Hemingway Museum and Home, in Key West, protected by the terms of his will.



What is Polydactyl?

The trait for polydactyl comes from a dominant gene, and only a polydactyl cat can parent another polydactyl. Although the Maine Coon (whose ancestors are also thought to have immigrated to the U.S. aboard ships) is believed to have been the first breed to have this trait, polydactyl is considered a fault in that breed, and indeed in every other breed except the Pixie Bob, a relatively new breed.

So, rather than a breed, polydactyl is just a genetic trait, somewhat like the genetics for the tabby pattern. Instead of the normal 18 toes (five on each front foot and four on the rear) found on most cats, polydactyls have six or more toes on the front feet, and sometimes an extra toe on the rear. (The cat depicted in the photo has seven toes in front, which makes it easy to understand why they are sometimes called "Mitten Cats.") However, unlike the popular tabby, whose pattern can be found in many breeds, the polydactyl is frowned upon by breed registries. . . Although not approved as "purebreds," polydactyls are adored by their human companions. Whether called "polydactyls," "Hemingway Cats," or "Mittens," these many-toed cats warm the hearts and hearths of those people fortunate enough to share a home with one.

Is Your Dog Legal? Get Fido Licensed

Island County requires all dog owners to license their dogs every year. One time is not enough, you must renew each year; there are no exceptions. Make your dog legal and the tag helps identify your dog in case he or she is lost.

2011 dog licenses are now on sale at the Shelter or at the Camano Island Annex on NE Camano Drive.



The cost is \$7 for spayed/neutered dogs and \$25 for intact animals. Special rates for seniors (65+) \$4/\$20. Group license is \$100.

Avoid a late fee – Purchase by March 31, 2011.
