Above and Beyond

At CASA we believe that every animal matters, not just the young and healthy. We strive to go "above and beyond" to help animals in need of medical care.

Chevy came to CASA just hours before she was scheduled to be euthanized. For this family her care had become too expensive to continue. She had a raw and bleeding rash on her back end that was later attributed to poor diet. She was also afflicted with juvenile-onset glaucoma leading to total blindness at an early age. By the time she was 7 years old her eyes were bulging and painful, and were long-overdue to be removed. She was suffering, and it was the decision of the shelter manager to take Chevy under the loving care of CASA and get her the medical attention she needed.

CASA has a special relationship with Dr. Tim O'Rourke at the Animal Care Center in Mt. Vernon. He's volunteered many hours of free or discounted surgical procedures for CASA's animals in need. He stepped in to remove Chevy's painful eyes. In only a few short weeks she was pain free and her personality really began to shine. She remained in a foster home, coming to the shelter during the days so she could meet potential adopters until she finally went to her forever home in Marysville.

Snowden came to the shelter badly injured after likely being hit by a car. CASA was contacted when his owner could not pay for the necessary vet care and felt their only option might be to end Snowden's life. Immediately after arriving at CASA he was taken to our

local vet clinic for an assessment of his injuries and to make him more comfortable. After the initial assessment, he was taken to Dr. O'Rourke for treatment. He determined that Snowden had breaks in two legs, some broken toes in another, and had fractured his pelvis in multiple places. It was his opinion, however, that with surgery on the main leg, some splinting on the other, and strict crate rest for his pelvis, Snowden could live and have a full life. After several surgeries, Snowden has recovered and has been adopted.



Zoey is enjoying her forever home.

In Zoey's case, her allergic skin problem and expensive food diet placed her in the underdog category. She remained at the shelter overlooked by potential adopters for nearly 6 months. Her health began to deteriorate again, and it was time to bring her into a foster home that could offer her relief from the stress of the kennel. With a great deal of patience and perseverance, she was finally diagnosed with a chronic inflammatory skin condition classified as atopic dermatitis along with her food allergies. Because her skin was so inflamed and damaged, she had secondary bacterial and yeast infections that required months of medications to heal. Although her skin issues will always be with

her, Zoey was on her way to a full recovery after years of intractable itchy skin.

All was well with Zoey in her foster home until she tore her ACL and required surgery. Once again Dr. O'Rourke stepped in to care for Zoey. Even with a significant discount, Zoey's surgery was an expensive one. Fortunately, through social media and online fundraising, CASA was able to raise the \$2,500 it cost to perform her surgery. Zoey has since recovered and was adopted by her foster parents.

All of these animals had different special needs, but what they do have in common is that they might have died if CASA had not gone "above and beyond." It is the support of animal lovers like you which provides us with the ability to say yes to these cats and dogs who desperately need our help.







Reasons Why You Should Not Use a Retractable Leash

A retractable leash is not so much a leash as it is a length of thin cord wound around a spring-loaded device housed inside a plastic handle. The handles of most retractable leashes are designed to fit comfortably in a human hand. A button on the handle controls how much of the cord is extended. Retractable leashes are popular primarily because they aren't as confining as regular leashes, allowing dogs more freedom to sniff and poke around on walks. But unfortunately, there are downsides to this type of leash.

- The length of retractable leashes, some of which can extend up to 26 feet, allows dogs to get far enough away from their humans that a situation can quickly turn dangerous. A dog on a retractable leash is often able to run into the middle of the street, for example, or make uninvited contact with other dogs or people.
- If pet is being approached by an aggressive dog, it is nearly impossible to get control of the situation if the need arises. It's much easier to regain control of – or protect – a dog at the end of a six-foot standard flat leash than it is if he's 20 or so feet away at the end of what amounts to a thin string.
- The thin cord of a retractable leash can break – especially when a powerful dog is on the other end of it. If a strong, good-sized dog takes off at full speed, the cord can snap.
- If a dog walker gets tangled up in the cord of a retractable leash, or grabs it in an attempt to reel in their dog, it can result in severe injuries.
- Dogs have also received terrible injuries as a result of the sudden jerk on their neck that occurs when they run out the leash.
- Retractable leashes are an especially bad idea for dogs that haven't been trained to walk politely on a regular leash. By their very nature, retractables train dogs to pull while on leash, because they learn that pulling extends the lead.
