Message from the Shelter Manager

So many things happen each day at contracted animal shelters like CASA. When you take in stray and surrendered animals you don't have real control over your pet population. The shelter is a never-ending wheel of efforts; it is in constant motion. Even in the night dogs can come in and when you show up the next day you magically have three more. In order for more pets to come in, others must go out to make room. When adoptions slow down we need your help to keep our wheel going. Some pets stay longer simply because they need a broader range of exposure in order to grab the attention of the right adopter.

Many see the same pet's face and feel that there must be something wrong with them and that is why they are still at the shelter. The simplest reason some pets remain at the shelter is because each human and each pet have individual personalities, likes, dislikes, needs, etc. I guarantee you don't make the exact choices your best friend or even closest relative makes – so you might also want something different in your future pet. Pets with easy personalities and juveniles are the easiest to adopt out regardless of type – these may be chosen by everyone from first-time pet owners to well-seasoned ones. Pets who are more particular in their needs wait longer since their pool of adopters ends up limited. Some may simply not be the best choice for a first-time owner and this alone could cut the number of visiting parties in half. Pets that prefer the company of people to other pets may end up only a candidate for two percent of all the people who actually visited the shelter that week. That's a tough percentage.

It is critical for us to publicize our adoptable pets, but cannot do it alone - we need your help. Don't worry, the kind of help we are asking for is actually very easy. Some of the most effective ways to help us get pets adopted is word of mouth. That could be as simple as telling one person about pet at the shelter or going to the website and choosing one to share on social media with your friends. Are you a business owner? Print one of those adoptable pets and put it on your door that week, you may be surprised how one simple share could lead to an animal finally leaving the shelter. If you have a little more time and want to step up your efforts, you could come in and meet one of the shelter animals, then share your personal experience too. Imagine what that day will feel like when you realize it was YOU that found them an adopter. Who are you going to help this week?

Against All Odds

Misha, a senior coonhound mix was brought to CASA and surrendered. All her basic medical care was done and she was scheduled for a spay. While Misha waited for her appointment, she was posted for adoption on the CASA website-

A couple came to the shelter and fell in love with her. They expressed their desire to adopt her and, after reviewing their application, their request for adoption was approved. Since Misha was not yet spayed, her adoption was "deferred" pending her spay appointment and the adopter would pick her up after this was done. This typically takes place within a week at the local vet.

The appointment was scheduled, but just before the day arrived, the clinic called to reschedule and it would now be almost two more weeks until they could spay her. Without the ability to do spay and neuter surgeries at the shelter, CASA is completely dependent on outside veterinary clinics when it comes to surgeries. During the last week of waiting, staff grew concerned about the extra weight Misha had been adding on. Although some dogs can gain weight in the shelter, they thought her mid-section was feeling more and more firm. Staff whisked her off to the vet for an x-ray, worried she might have

been secretly pregnant when she was surrendered. Although it is not ideal for an 8+ year old dog to have puppies, it is also not unheard of and we had no choice but to carry on.

CASA called the awaiting adopters to explain the new information and firm up a change of plans. She went into foster with her planned adopters with the agreement that they would foster Misha and once born they would bring mom and puppies back to CASA for weekly checkups. Misha's foster parents assisted in the birth of one, two, ...twelve puppies. They were all similar, but each unique in their own way; six males and six females. Misha was an amazing mother. She was loving, nurturing, and very attentive to the needs of all her puppies.

Allowing twelve puppies to stay in one foster home the entire two months was unique. If the puppies had been brought to the shelter without a mother, they would have been separated into groups of three or four and sent to different foster homes since large litters are a lot of work even for the most experienced foster homes. These foster parents were determined to succeed with each and every puppy.

When the puppies were nearing the end of weaning, the foster parents reported that Misha seemed very tired and they were worried she may have somehow hurt her leg in the night as it seemed to be bothering her. Exhaustion is fairly common for moms with really large litters like Misha's since it takes a lot of energy to produce enough milk, tend to their feeding and cleaning needs, while also getting enough nutrition to cover both puppies and the mother at the same time.



Misha was taken to a clinic near the foster home for examination. The vet confirmed that Misha was tired, dehydrated, and ultimately needed to start focusing on her own body without any more puppy depletion. She was able to get some supportive care throughout the day at the vet. She left seeming a little better, received some basic pain meds for her aching leg and was to come back in a couple days to be rechecked. Sadly, Misha took a turn for the worse just days later and her next visit to the vet was an emergency one. Misha passed away after arriving at the clinic and left everyone around her confused and devastated. The veterinarian who cared for Misha needed an answer for this too and offered to perform a necropsy. It was determined that Misha had died of a previously obscure form of cancer. Against all odds, but most likely the sheer willpower and love of a mother, Misha had lived long enough to ensure her puppies were weaned so they could live on their own.

The twelve bouncy, wiggly, and healthy puppies were brought to the shelter in order to prepare for their spay and neuter surgeries and go up for adoption. Two of the puppies were adopted by their foster parents so Misha's legacy will live on in their home. Two other puppies were adopted together and the others went to individual homes. Shelter staff established an online social group specifically for the adopters of Misha's puppies so the new families can exchange experiences and share pictures as they grow up and to also plan reunion play-dates in the future. Against all odds, a special mother brought twelve little puppies into this world and they have now been "brought together with caring people, forever enriching their lives."

When we got him home he spent all day under a blanket in the spare bedroom (his safe room), and we never saw him out. If you petted him through the blanket he would purr and do elevator butt, but he did not want you to look at him. This stage took several weeks. But the combination of food and enforced blanket pets, along with the occasional slow removal of the blanket while petting him, did eventually work.

First big mile stone was him actually COMING OUT to greet us when we went in the room. He was still a bit conflicted, would come up to be petted but then immediately turn around and walk off a bit. He loves neck and throat scratches, but doesn't love being petted on top of his head. He's also a happy drooler and a bit of a low-threshold cat, there's a limit to how long he wants to be petted and then there's a nibble. We have learned to stop first.

He now has full access to the house, is lovely with the other cats (was always good with them), and comes to eat with the rest of the crew. At night they go galloping around the house sounding like a herd of goats. He will probably always be jumpy, and strangers will likely never see him when they come over, but that's okay. 
Bill (formerly Moe)

We come in 7 days a week no matter what and make sure our shelter kids are happy and healthy and have everything they could possibly need while they are with us. Being small has its struggles.

A lot of people don't know who we are and what we stand for, but we still work hard every day. We put ourselves out there because the animals mean everything to us and the only way we can find their fur-ever home is by showing up and putting our animals first. We go home and all we think about is CASA and what we can do to make things better. Not for us, but for the animals. We are their family until they find their forever home and even after.

2019 Intake and Outcome Statistics - Over 600 Animals Came to CASA

Intake	Total	Stray	Surrender	Transfer In	Impound	Return
Cat	319	141	138	34	0	6
Dog	292	51	101	95	36	9

In 2019, 617 animals (including cats, dogs, and other pets) came to CASA. CASA takes strays, impounds and surrenders from Camano Island, but we also bring in dogs and cats from other shelters as space permits and surrenders from elsewhere. We were able to help 95 dogs and 34 cats from other shelters this year that may not have had a chance otherwise.

Of the animals that came into CASA in 2019, the majority were adopted or returned to their owners. CASA partners with local rescue groups to find homes for dogs who are difficult to place or who need more than a shelter provides.

As a No-Kill shelter, CASA never puts animals to sleep for convenience or lack of space. The deaths last year included underage kittens some of whom died in foster care, others who arrived gravely injured and other cats and dogs that had to be put to sleep because they were terminally ill and in the final stages of their illnesses.

Did you know?
