Message From The Shelter Manager

Most of you know CASA helps pets on the island, but you may not know about the lives of other pets we have helped change. The shelter has times when we do a great job of getting the word out about our pets so they find homes quickly. Recently, we have had times when our dog kennels are almost empty. Although empty dog kennels leave a smile on the staff's faces because those dogs found homes, we can't help but think of it as wasted space, space that could be used to help other dogs. We see the faces of wonderful dogs sitting at overcrowded shelters getting closer to the day they may lose their life just because they are lost in the sea of homeless dogs or due to how they look. When people stop in at CASA to see dogs and we don't have any, we feel those people may be the home those dogs on borrowed time are waiting for.

Because of this, CASA takes dogs from other shelters whenever we can. Many of these dogs were days away from euthanasia and because of CASA are now beloved members of adoptive homes. Since we do this only when space is available, transferring in animals from other shelters never impacts our ability to help pets from Camano. CASA is proud to be in a position to help animals from other shelters when we have the ability to do so. Please take a moment to view our adoptable pets and read about each pet's journey that led them to the helping hands of CASA.

Tom's Ongoing Story

Tom's story has many chapters, but right now he's waiting for the one that begins, "So Tom has found his Forever Home..."

Tom came to CASA in March of 2010 because his owner became very ill and was unable to care for him any longer. Because he is so regal and striking, the staff assumed that Tom would be quickly adopted. Unfortunately, this didn't happen because although Tom is a loving cat, he is the one who chooses when it is "loving time." Tom has what the people who work at CASA call "cattitude" and he was a bit bossy to the other CASA cats. As a result, each night before everyone left, it became necessary to place him alone into one of the large kennels in the cat room.



One October morning Tom had a freak accident. While being removed from his kennel, his leg got wedged in it somehow. By the time he was extricated his rear right leg had been damaged. When it was discovered how severe the injury was Tom was taken to the vet where his leg was placed into a soft cast in hopes that it would heal on its own. After some time had passed we were faced with the reality that this approach did not work. Tom was getting around, but the ankle joint was non-functional and caused him considerable discomfort and pain. After consulting with a few veterinarians, it was decided that Tom's leg had to be amputated. A plea was posted on the CASA website asking for funds to pay for Tom's surgery. CASA's great supporters rose to the occasion and donated \$1253, well above the requested \$850.

As time continued, Tom continued to heal. He was reexamined, X-rayed again, and a second opinion was obtained. Now Tom's leg had reached a point where he could be a candidate for fusion of the damaged bone along with a plate to strengthen it. The specialist, Dr. O'Rourke of the Animal Care Center in Mount Vernon, felt this would be a better approach for Tom since he is a senior and having all four legs in his old age would clearly be best for him. *Continued on page 2 - Tom's Ongoing Story*

In early February, Tom was operated on by Dr. O'Rourke. While he was working his magic, Dr. O'Rourke also took the time to clean up some arthritic areas in Tom's body. His surgery went very well and he returned to the shelter where he spent time in our quiet isolation room in a large kennel. He remained on "bed rest" for awhile. Tom has settled back into life at CASA now in his new personal room. Now that he is feeling better Tom has mellowed out quite a bit.

One year after arriving at CASA, he again waits for someone special to adopt him. He still needs a home where he can be an only cat - he still wants to be king of his castle. Please stop by the shelter to meet Tom and help him start the final chapter of his story.

Available Pets Appear on Website Immediately

Using CASA's new PetPoint software, when an animal becomes available for adoption, it is immediately available on the CASA website. The new software updates Petango.com, the online pet listing service that helps people find adoptable pets, their pictures, information, and the stories staff write for them. You can easily find all of our adoptable pets on the CASA website, camanoanimalshelter.org. We will continue to update Petfinder.com, another online pet listing service, but since these updates must be posted manually these updates will take more time and will be used as needed.

Lost Pets Displayed on Website

If your pet is lost, contact the shelter and the CASA staff will help you file a Missing Pet Report if your pet is not currently at the shelter. Your missing pet's picture and description will be displayed on our Lost Pets Page. Since CASA is one of over 1,300 shelters using Petango's Lost & Found program we will submit a lost pet notification that is sent to Petango.com and all Petango Lost & Found subscribers in your area. The email includes pictures and a detailed profile of your dog or cat to help subscribers identify and find your pet.

Animal Videos

Thanks to a donation of a video camera, we can bring you clips of our dogs enjoying themselves in the yard and cats/kittens roaming free in the shelter. By clicking on the **YouTube** button on the Home page, you will be able to see videos of dogs and cats at CASA.





Smile! Dental Care for Your Pets

Do you avoid getting up close and personal with your pet's breath? That bad breath is certainly unpleasant enough, but your pet could have a worse problem. Tartar buildup on teeth and inflamed gums can actually undermine your pet's good health.

FOREVER HOME

Do animals have dental disease?

Sure they do! Dental disease is actually seen more often in pets than it is in humans. Why? Because pets can't brush or floss their teeth. So it's no surprise that 80 percent of dogs and 70 percent of cats show signs of dental disease by the age of four. In fact, dental disease is probably one of the most common health problems in dogs and cats.

In humans, the cavity is the most common form of dental disease, but in dogs and cats, it's tartar buildup. Tartar causes irritation of the gums, loosening of the teeth, exposure of the tooth roots, infection, tooth abscesses, and, eventually, tooth loss. An untreated infection within the mouth may be picked up by the bloodstream and carried to other parts of the body. The result can be more serious health risks, such as kidney, liver and heart disease. Also, sore, painful and loose teeth can make your pet very uncomfortable and unwilling or unable to eat properly.

Won't feeding my pet dry food prevent dental problems?

Most people believe that feeding their pets dry food is enough to ward off dental problems. Not so. Diet is probably much less important to prevent tartar buildup than most people think. Dry food is less sticky, of course, and does not adhere to the teeth as readily as canned food. But, eating dry food does not remove tartar from the teeth. Certain chewing toys or strips (especially those that contain enzymes) designed to clean the teeth may help tartar buildup somewhat, but only a professional cleaning by your veterinarian can remove tartar once it forms.

What contributes to dental disease in pets?

One of the main factors is your pet's individual mouth chemistry. Some pets need yearly cleanings; others need cleanings only once every few years. Breed also plays a role in your pet's dental health. Small dogs, especially those with short faces (*Pekingese*, *pugs*, *etc.*) are particularly prone to dental problems, as are Persian cats.

How can I tell if my pet has dental disease?

Well, bad breath is one obvious clue. But you may also see yellow-brown teeth covered with a barnacle-like hard substance and red irritated gums that bleed easily. You may even see loose teeth that are very tender to the touch. However, the best way to determine if your pet needs a dental cleaning is to have your veterinarian do a dental health checkup.

What does a dental cleaning involve?

If your vet determines that your pet needs a dental cleaning, here's what happens. First, your pet must be completely anesthetized. It is not possible to thoroughly clean the teeth if your pet is awake. Your pet's teeth will be cleaned, scaled with an ultrasonic scaler, and polished. A thorough evaluation of the teeth will determine if any of them need to be pulled. The vet will examine the entire oral cavity to look for abnormalities such as tumors or deep infections of the gums or jawbone.

After the cleaning, your pet may need to take oral antibiotics and eat a softer diet for a few days, particularly if there was a lot of infection or if many teeth had to be extracted. When your pet goes home, you will be advised on the proper dental care program for your pet.

So, to keep your pet smiling, schedule regular veterinary dental exams!

Remember CASA in Your Will

By making a bequest to the Camano Animal Shelter Association (CASA) in your Will, you can make a profound and lasting impact on the welfare of countless animals cared for at the shelter every year. When preparing your Will, you make the decisions on how your possessions will be distributed. If you already have a Will, you can write a codicil (an addendum) that names the Camano Animal Shelter Association as a beneficiary of your estate.

When naming CASA in your Will, you may leave a specific dollar amount, a set percentage of your estate, or a particular property. To include CASA in your Will, you must specify its proper name and street address. Your bequest can be simply stated; for example: "I give to the Camano Animal Shelter Association, 198 Can Ku Road, Camano Island, Washington 98282 (PO Box 1726, Stanwood, Washington 98292), federal tax ID number 601-893-464, the sum of dollars to be used for its general purposes." (If you are leaving insurance policies, land or other property, please describe it.) An attorney can advise you regarding taxes and other aspects of estate planning.

Consider starting a jar and label it "For the animals at CASA." Every so often, bring the contents of the jar to the shelter. Leave your name, address and email. 
