Message from the Shelter Manager

Spring has sprung and with that "Kitten Season" is nearing. With all of the work CASA has pertaining to kittens during the warmer months we want to urge everyone to spay and neuter your pets. This is the only way to help end the suffering and homelessness of unplanned litters of kittens. Even if your pets are fixed, you can help by urging others to do the same. It seems so simple when people say they already have people who want a kitten, but the truth is in most cases those kittens will then go to homes where they have a low likelihood of being spayed or neutered themselves and will go on to reproduce more kittens.

If someone is looking for a kitten, please tell them about CASA and the benefits of adopting. All kittens from CASA are already spayed or neutered, current on age appropriate vaccines, wormed, flea treated and microchipped with completed registration. Our \$100 adoption fee for kittens includes all of that and is a huge discount considering just a spay at the vet is around \$70. Not only do you save money when adopting, you save a life. Many of the kittens spend time in a foster home and CASA staff will be able to tell you if the kitten has been around dogs, other cats and even children in some cases.

Another way to help save lives is to open your home to foster kittens until they are ready for adoption. The commitment can be as little as two weeks. To find out more about fostering please visit the shelter in person. We hope to see you soon!

NO KILL SHELTER - HOW YOU CAN HELP

A "No-Kill" shelter, what does this really mean? By definition (and our pledge to our animals), we never euthanize an animal to make space or for convenience. Behind the scenes this means that we all must work even harder to find homes for all of the animals, including those who are hard to adopt or have special needs. Since those pets will be with us longer than others, we strive to make their stay with us a pleasant one while also marketing them more frequently to the public.

Since the beginning of 2012, we have had several long time residents. Recently three of our special needs dogs found homes. Miller a 12 month old completely consumed by Demodex Mange and an additional yeast infection of the skin eventually made his way to Motley Zoo Animal Rescue where he will continue his treatment and eventually go up for adoption. Brinx, an older dog who had a cancerous tumor successfully removed found a home through Old Dog Haven. Dale, an almost completely blind dog, was adopted. In addition, after staying at the shelter for over three months, Diesel and Dunkin were adopted.

Two dogs, Conrad and Bubba, have both been here over six months. They are waiting for that special person who will see beyond their excitable barking while in the shelter kennels through to their true lovable personalities. We have the chance to make their stay enjoyable while they wait for their "Forever Homes." You can help by spreading the word and/or volunteering to visit with them. Look into their eyes and see their gratitude.

FOREVER HOME

Although being "No-Kill" is hard work, it is gratifying knowing we view each animal as an individual. We do not classify them as too sick, too old, too much training needed, not perfect, etc. If it is illness that can be addressed and the animal is given a chance to live happy and healthy, thanks to your donations we work to make them well. If they are a senior pet with typical senior issues we work to make them comfortable and happy while looking for someone who wants to love them in those last years.

Surprisingly, underage kittens and those who need bottle feeding are sometimes euthanized at other shelters. CASA works hard to find foster homes for kittens who need round the clock bottle feeding in their first weeks of life to give them a chance at life. We do not give up on them simply because of their age. Even FIV Positive cats who are otherwise healthy get an opportunity for a "Forever Home" at CASA. These are some of the joys and challenges that come with being a "No-Kill" shelter; we know the animals are worth it.




CASA Income for 2011

AN INDOOR CAT IS A HAPPY CAT!

As a responsible cat owner, you know that cats need a caring home to be healthy and happy. Keeping them indoors is a critical part in providing that caring home. We often feel that there is something "wild" about our beloved cats; but in fact they are domestic animals, not wildlife. Every time that they visit the outdoors, they are at risk for a host of dangers. By keeping our cats indoors we protect our cats, protect wildlife, and are better neighbors.

AS AN INDOOR CAT

What would your cat gain?

As many as ten to fifteen years of additional life, on average

Better daily health

Drastically fewer injuries, infections, and illnesses

A safer, more comfortable environment

What would you gain?

A healthier cat and fewer veterinary visits

Reduced risk of transmittable diseases especially to pregnant women

A flea-free zone

Appreciative neighbors

Peace of mind knowing your cat is safe

What would your cat miss?

Being hit by a car

Being killed by drinking anti-freeze and other commonly accessible poisons

Contracting serious or incurable diseases like feline leukemia, distemper, or FIV

Being killed by predators such as coyotes or even eagles or owls

Being trapped, deliberately poisoned, stolen, or inhumanely treated

Illnesses, such as tularemia and toxoplasmosis, from consuming a wild bird, mammal,

reptile, or amphibian

ENRICHING INDOOR LIVING FOR THE CAT IN YOUR LIFE

Resting perches: Make a resting shelf or high perch by a window so your cat can see outside.

Outdoor Enclosures: Animal shelters and veterinarians have plans for safe outdoor enclosures (or search "Outdoor Cat Enclosure" on the web).

A Clean Litter Box: Scoop your cat's litter daily to provide a clean, happy "bathroom".

Open a Screened Window: Access to the smells and sounds of the great outdoors can provide hours of enjoyment for your cat.

Toys: Keep lots of different kinds of toys to intrigue different parts of your cat's brain.

Include bags and boxes, "chase" toys (balls, small objects, etc.) and "kill" toys (catnip animals such as stuffed mice).

Rotate the toys, and store "out of play" toys in a large jar or a bag with some loose catnip.

Hide toys and treats around the house.

Get lots of "interactive" toys like fishing poles with toys on them and play with your cat regularly.

Suspend toys from tables.

Get your cat microchipped:

Just in case your indoor cat gets outdoors, a microchip will help ensure your cat comes home safely. Licenses for cats are not required in Island County but may be required elsewhere. Be sure to check about cat licenses in your municipality and provide them for your cat if needed.

Helping an Outdoor Cat Become An Indoor Cat

Provide gradual adjustment time. Bring your cat in for an increasingly longer time each day.

Don't Feel Guilty

If you are absolutely convinced that the indoor life simply does not fit your cat's lifestyle, pledge to make your next cat an indoor only cat. And make sure that all of your cats are spayed or neutered. Your next cat will thank you!

And Our Wild Friends are Pretty Happy Too!

There are more than half a million cats in the Puget Sound area. If each cat caught one bird a month, six million birds would be killed in our community alone every single year. An estimated 20 percent of all injured animals brought into the PAWS Wildlife Center were injured through attacks by cats.

Cats Are Predators

A cat's instinct is to hunt, stalk, and kill. Just because you don't see evidence in your backyard doesn't mean they haven't been killing wildlife.

Well Fed Cats Still Hunt

Our cats' urge to hunt and chase is located in a different part of their brain than their urge to eat; it doesn't matter how hungry they are. Bells don't help; cats learn to walk soundlessly.

By keeping our cats indoors we protect our pets, save wildlife, and are better neighbors.
